The Sun setting behind these altocumulus clouds seems to set the sky on fire.

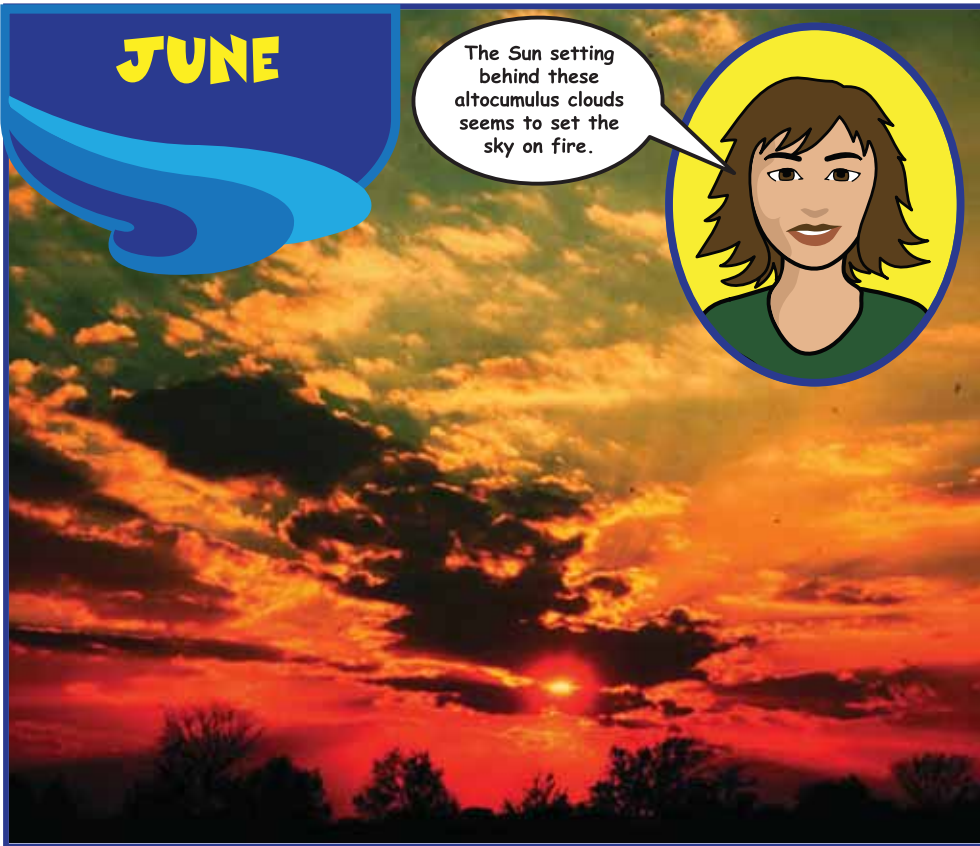
