	1 1910: Wellington, WA, Avalanche, the worst avalanche in U.S. history, sweeps away two trains and the train station, killing 96.	2 1966: Severe blizzard hits Minnesota and North Dakota with winds up to 100 mph, and snowdrifts 30 to 40 feet high.	3 1953: Snow is reported on the island of Oahu, HI.	4	5	6 1962: The Great Atlantic Storm causes hundreds of millions of dollars in damage in six states over three days, killing 40 and injuring over 1,000.
7	8	9 1956: A record 367 inches of snow is measured on the ground at Rainier Paradise Ranger Station in Washington.	10	11	12 1993: Superstorm drops 50 inches of snow in part of North Carolina.	13
14	15	16 1942: Baldwin, MS, is struck by two tornadoes only 24 minutes apart, killing 65.	17	18	19 1884: Enigma Tornado Outbreak. More than 41 tornadoes sweep across the southeast U.S., killing 178 and injuring 1056.	20 1948: Tornado destroys 52 planes at Tinker AFB, OK, causing more than \$10 million in damage. Vernal Equinox (Spring begins)
21	22	23	24 1948: The second tornado in less than a week hits Tinker AFB, OK. It is the first officially predicted tornado ever.	25 1913: Ten inches of rain deluges the Ohio River Basin, drowning 467 people and causing \$147 million in damage.	26	27
28 1983: NOAA-E/8 is launched. It is the first U.S. satellite to include the search and rescue package.	29	30	31 1992: Official end of first winter without snow in Seattle, WA.			



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
